Too bad the hills aren't edible chocolates--- mint chocolate in rainy season, regular chocolate in dry season--- LOL. There are 1,268 hills carved by nature. Ahhh, before one can reach the Chocolate Hills there is another attraction. It is the man-made forest called Bilar's. The trees in this forest were planted in the 6o's. It is

one of the largest restoration projects in our country's history. For the nature and scenery lovers, have your P50 ready to see the hills.

to Hinagdanan Cave. It's a cave that has an underground lagoon with stalagmites and stalactites -- the perfect tourist destination for adventurists.



Bring a valid identification card or ID always. Check mo na rin ang expiry date once in a while para hindi maabala sa oras na hiningi ito.




Be time conscious and come earlier than scheduled, lalo na pag may appointment.

Byahe Na! held an interview with Atty. Ariel Enrile Inton as former LTFRB Board Member and now Head of Lawyers for Commuters' Safety & Protection (LCSP). After his term at LTFRB, he continued to serve the commuting public by providing free legal assistance through his office together with a few lawyer friends and volunteers.

What form of assistance do you give?

We give free legal assistance for commuters whose rights are violated while in public transport, yung mga na-refuse sumakay, na aksidente, na sexual harassment, etc.

Who compose your group?

About 20 lawyers and a hundred plus non-lawyer volunteers. The core group are Attorneys Raji Mendoza, Anel Antero, Vj Topacio, Daniel Adeva, Ton Cabrera, Niño Casimiro and Rolando Sibal. In Cebu and Iloilo – Attys. Rosel Alfar and Jom Lamparero.

How can commuters reach you?

Through social media: our website and Facebook account (Lawyers for Commuters Safety and Protection). Just message us. The media can also refer cases to us. The only criteria for a case is: cause of action.

Do commuters have to pay for the services?

No. This is free (probono). LCSP is an advocacy. Right now it is for Metro Manila but will soon expand nationwide.

What are the top basic rights of commuters?

Right to a safe, convenient and efficient journey, no discrimination, right to a just and fair "fare". But the commuter must also respect the driver and other passengers.

How can a commuter claim against a public transport in case of injury?

All passengers onboard are insured with the mandated Personal Passenger Accident Insurance. They get benefits on the insurance policy. A case can also be filed against the operator for additional financial assistance.

What are the privileges of Senior Citizens?

20% discount on fares and specially allocated seats.

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Palapit na ang 2018... puro Lechong Manok na lang ba ang ilalapag natin sa handaan? Habang hindi pa mataas ang presyo ng manok, buy na ng Jumbo sized chickens at gawing Hamon! Ito ang "hamon" ko sa inyong Byahe Na! readers na mahilig magluto.

Madali lang naman... parang nag-tocino kayo pero buong manok ito! Pwedeng-pwede ipang negosyo! As long as kumpleto ang mga gamit at ingredients - go na! Ang first step ay "brining" – ibinababad ang manok sa solution of water, rock salt and white sugar. After that, injection of curing solution na. Then after a few days – Chicken Ham na! Maligayang Manok!!!





- Brining solution = 16 parts water, 1 part rock salt and 1 part white sugar.
- Immerse the chicken in this solution for about 8 hours - while in a cool place.
- Drain out marinade. Rinse and pat dry.

Curing Solution:

½ tsp. pink salt or salitre 1-2 Tbsp. anisado wine 1-2 Tbsp. sugar syrup 1 tablet ascorbic acid (durugin sa sugar syrup)

Use a curing syringe or syringe na malaki ang butas. Combine lahat ng ingredients at i-inject ito sa mga makakapal na parte ng manok (thighs, breast and drumstick)

- Kung walang syringe, ibabad ang manok sa curing solution for 2-3 days inside the refrigerator in a covered bowl (multiply curing solution x 4)
- Wash very well. Pat Dry.
- Cook in pineapple juice, peppercorns, laurel, coriander seeds or leaves.
- Check kung luto na. Cool and chill .
- Before giving away, cover well with Cling wrap and red cellophane pag i-reregalo na.
- Napaka swerte naman nung makakatanggap nyan!

Bvahe Na! 7 Byahe Na!



When members of the House of Representatives, led by Speaker of the House Pantaleon Alvarez and Majority Leader Rodolfo Fariñas, went around the country last March to inspect not just the tourism facilities but also the road networks and condition, port facilities, accessibility of traders and farmers, and safety of passengers and users as part of its oversight functions, the lawmakers took the scenic route, covering over 3,000 kilometers in 10 days from Manila to Batangas, Calapan, Bulalacao, Caticlan, Boracay, Kalibo, Iloilo, Bacolod, Dumaguete, Dapitan, Dakak, Aurora, Cagayan de Oro, Malaybalay, Davao, Samal Island, Butuan, Surigao del Norte, Liloan, Tacloban, Legazpi, and Quezon Province, via the roll-on, roll-off (RORO) ferries of FastCat.

While one of the objectives of the trip, according to Rep. Fariñas, was "to experience the mode of travel of the ordinary traveler and inspect the seaworthiness of the ROROs and the roadworthiness of the highways and bridges along the Nautical Highway," the Majority Floor Leader certainly made the most of this extensive inter-island journey. Together with his colleagues, he checked out various road conditions on his motorcycle, posed for posterity shots at the iconic San Juanico Bridge before entering Leyte from Samar, and braved Asia's longest zip line in Dahilayan, Bukidnon. "The things I do to promote domestic tourism!" quipped Fariñas on his Instagram account.



For FastCat President Christopher Pastrana, there's no better way to see the Philippines. Aircraft may get you to your destination faster, but "with an efficient land and sea transportation network, you can explore the beauty of the Philippines in 7-10 days," he says. "Before spending time and money traveling to other countries, visit the Philippines first: there's so much to see and do here, and you get to know your fellow Filipinos from the countryside and help the local economy in the process."

Since its incorporation in 2002, Archipelago Philippine Ferries Corporation, or FastCat, has made it its mission to connect the Philippines' 7,107 islands and its neighboring countries through a safe, fast, convenient, and world-class ferry transport system for passengers and cargo. Meanwhile, its alliance with bus companies JAM Liner (which plies the Manila-Laguna-Batangas-Quezon route) and Philtranco (which traverses Manila to Pampanga, Bicol, and parts of the Visayas and Mindanao) provides a seamless travel experience, as well as an enriching one. "You get to immerse yourself in certain areas during stopovers, and discover things you would not have seen or known if you were on a plane," says Pastrana.

Need more reason to discover the Philippines on a FastCat? There's a lot: It has a growing list of routes. For now, thrill seekers can map out their forthcoming adventures through FastCat's ferry routes in Batangas-Calapan (Mindoro), Bulalacao (Mindoro)-Caticlan (Aklan), Matnog (Sorsogon)-San Isidro (Samar), Bacolod-Iloilo, Liloan (Leyte)-Lipata (Surigao), Dumaguete (Negros Oriental)-Dapitan (Zamboanga del Norte), San Carlos Occidental)-Toledo (Cebu), and Cebu-Tubigon (Bohol). (Negros

More routes will be added to the roster, as Pastrana aims to cover all the bases of the archipelago, from its northernmost tip to its southernmost tip, he says. This means routes that connect Luzon to Babuyan Islands and Batanes, and Zamboanga, Jolo, and Basilan to Pagadian. And it doesn't end there: by 2020, FastCat targets operations in at least 30 ports, as well as regional routes to Kudat, Malaysia by 2018.

It maintains an international-standard fleet of ferries. Specifically designed to suit the country's unique weather and sea conditions, FastCat's fleet of Ropax (roll-on, roll-off passenger) vessels was introduced during an aggressive re-fleeting program in 2010. At present, the company operates with 10 ferries; 2 will be brought in this year, and an additional 18 or a total of 30 vessels by 2020. FastCat is looking beyond 2020 by connecting the Philippines, both by land and sea with more buses from JAM & Philtranco and FastCat vessels.

A picture of modernity, comfort, and stability, the FastCat ferry features a fully air-conditioned business class and premium economy sections and open-air economy section for 275 passengers. A spacious car deck accommodates up to 34 cars and 7 trucks and buses, and a snack bar comes with a wide variety of food and drinks to keep everyone on board satisfied before docking.

It's safe. Such modernized modes of sea transport have somehow eased the stigma attached to traveling by boat. News of tragedies involving old, decrepit, and overloaded wooden hull vessels leaving the port during bad weather have made many swear off ships for good—but not enough to affect business. According to the FastCat president, sea travel is up by 5 percent annually. "People should just know that there are better options available," he says. The summer months from March to June are ideal for travel, he adds, as the sea is calmer.

As for the recent spate of travel advisories, cautioning locals and foreigners from visiting parts of the Philippines that are high on insurgents' lists, Pastrana recently traveled to Palawan to inspect its port and was encouraged by what he saw. "There were so many international tourists," he recounts. "Some of them were planning to take the ferry from Bulalacao to Boracay—that's our route, and they learned about it through word of mouth."

Bottom line: Exercise caution, but don't allow others to get in the way of your plans, too. "We should not be 'hostaged' by these people," says Pastrana of threats. "We should not let them stop our goals and dreams."

That's exactly what FastCat's loyal patrons—middle-income families from the provinces who have goods to transport or bear gifts for their relatives and next-of-kin—have been doing for years. "Nakakataba ng puso," says Pastrana with a smile as he recounts the testimonials of everyday folks who rely on the efficiency and speed of his vessels, "to know that people choose to ride your ferry because they feel safer and more comfortable in it."

Bacolod City Public Market: A SUDCU TUTE HUD

When in Bacolod, it's a must to hit the public Central Market located downtown. Markets are microcosms of society, the pulse of local culture in a capsule... noisy, smelly, crowded, disorganized, and hot. You will love it! All your senses will be uplifted.

The cacophony of sounds is almost musical! Vendors asking, "Ano aton?" (What's ours?) is of a distinctive lilting llonggo tone. "'Day, banig?", "Batwan?". Knocking sounds from knives hitting chopping boards, or the constant whirring of coffee grinders, or of sewing machines at the tailors' row spell childlike wonders. What else can one experience in the market? Clothes altered while you wait, window shop at the handicrafts section. The busy basketrycum-souvenirs area greets you with the redolence of the forest captured in wood, rattan, nito vine, pandan, and bamboo. How lovely are the handiworks --- how low the prices! When the crowd is dense, watch out for overhung baskets woven in the caves of Calatrava, and be careful not to trip over clay pots, brooms, abaca ropes, and farm implements stacked along the narrow side aisles. With some digging into, you might unearth old-fashioned clothespins (kimpit) which are hard to find these days.

Aromas that waft in the market air are pleasant. The pungency of dried seafood along the Gatuslao side blends under the earthy scent of rice displayed in their sacks. Muscovado sugar would have smelled like fermented honey had it not been in plastic bags... but take some with you for healthy baking at home.

If the weather is too warm for comfort – fight heat with heat! Order a cup of black coffee for P10 per and pick some bites that will go with it. There are also vendors selling native delicacies such as suman (sticky rice cooked in brown sugar), suman latik (sticky rice topped with candied coconut strips), ibos (sticky rice cooked in coconut fronds), inday-inday, baye-baye, and bicho-bicho. The last three are really meant to be said twice so don't scrimp on the words or you'll get a blank look.

After coffee and llonggo goodies, amble farther along. Nearby are stalls displaying folk medicines foraged by the Aetas in the mountains and caves of Negros. There's sure to be a cure for bughat (relapse after childbirth), body aches, fever and other ailments. Believers buy fixes for supernatural problems. Do you need protection for your newborn? Want to ward off jealousy? Invite luck for your business? Warn you of any witches in the vicinity? The array of bottles,

barks, stones, leaves, and crystals just might work for you.

In the next block along the Luzuriaga side are the manoghilots who massage tired bones and muscles. Using age-old techniques, these women are the go-to healers for a cough that never goes away, or a chronic fever. But for victims of a vengeful spirit, relief by Susan, a manoghilot, could be the cure. She does her "clinic" by the Locsin side. Susan will do luy-a luy-a for those she thinks need it. By practice, manoghilots have no fixed fee for what they do. If you insist on paying, tuck the cash straight into her purse. Manoghilots will not touch money after treatment.

And there's more... The Bonifacio side of the 1950's public market has leather craftsmen who still do the artisanal trade of fashioning belts, repairing worn-out bag straps, and changing soles by hand. The quality of their handiwork is excellent and prices are reasonable.

The foodie in you should not miss buying a pack of Negros sea salt. These are usually sourced in the south of Bacolod (Bago or Pulupandan) and can be produced only about five months of the year when the days are dry and sunny. These beautiful crystals are the result of seawater pumped into their beds by windmills and left to dry in the sun. It is not a sin to buy plenty of asin for you are taking with you the sea, the sun, and the labor of Negrense hands.

The Bacolod City Central Market is a cornucopia of local delights from the guinamos (shrimp paste) to flavor our vegetable stew (laswa), to the baubles sold at small trinket stalls, to shellcraft for Mama's pasalubong. Check out the betelnut chewing pack: a smear of lime paste, a chunk of betelnut, and a wad of tobacco enclosed in a cone of betel leaf. Yes, betelnut chewing is still alive in these parts.

Let your senses and curiosity lead you to more sights, sounds and textures of this funky, folksy and unpretentious side of Negrense and go home with a chunk of the subculture to enrich your Bacolod experience.
